

Homelessness Prevention Program

 In 2012, United Way of Central Maryland established the first <u>Homelessness Prevention Program</u> site in the region to prevent homelessness for families in crisis. It is based on the <u>Siemer</u> <u>Institute for Family Stability's</u> evidence-based homelessness prevention model.



HOUSING

 The program provides emergency financial assistance to prevent eviction and utility shutoff, and intensive case management services to help families increase their income, reduce expenses, and better prepare for future crises.



Service Area and Partners

- Our <u>Homelessness</u> <u>Prevention Program (HPP)</u> includes 16 sites throughout the Central Maryland region.*
- We have implemented this program regionally through partnerships with several strong community-based organizations.

* This study only analyzes ROI for 15 sites (the 16th site is new).

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Greatest Impact (Annualized)

- Our program achieves the highest impact in the area of <u>Family Stability</u>. We prevent the homelessness of one individual at a cost of \$1,413 per individual.
- Our program achieves a high impact in the area of <u>Public</u> <u>Benefits</u>. We achieve total cost savings from decreased social safety net utilization of \$8,538,804
- Our program achieves lower impacts in the area of <u>Self-Sufficiency</u>, providing families with self-sufficiency support services. 49.6% (or 184) of all families were able to increase their income at a cost of \$9,764 per family
